ASH VALENTINES' DAY and EASTER FOOLS' DAY

This year Ash Wednesday happens to fall on Valentine's Day, February 14th. And if that isn't awkward enough, Easter Sunday is on April 1st, April Fools' Day! The last time this happened was in 1945. The next time it happens will be in the year 2029. So, I think I'll save this newsletter article and use it again in 11 years! Ha!

Ash Wednesday is one of the most solemn days of the church year, second only to Good Friday. It marks the beginning of the season of Lent, a time of preparation for Easter. Traditionally it was the time for training new believers in the faith, which is why many churches observe Mid-Week Lenten services. Often times the Mid-Week Lenten series is aimed at an educational focus. This year Trinity will be reviewing the six chief parts of *Luther's Small Catechism*. Ash Wednesday, which is not really a festival day remembering some person or event in the Bible, focuses on "repentance." That's why we observe the imposition of ashes as an act of humble repentance. As mentioned, this year Ash Wednesday falls on Valentine's Day which may present a distraction. Even though Valentine's Day was once observed as a commemoration of St. Valentine, today it has become more of a day of romance. Certainly it's a good opportunity to express one's love for family and friends, but it might be a little peculiar to attend an Ash Wednesday service and then go out to a romantic supper with a spouse or friend. Of course it could also remind us of God's great love and faithfulness to us. We know that when we repent and ask for mercy and forgiveness, the Lord does love and forgive us. One suggestion I heard is that you might consider celebrating Valentine's Day the day before (or some other day) and observe Ash Wednesday exclusively on February 14th. Whatever you decide to do, I urge you not to ignore Ash Wednesday and celebrate Valentine's Day instead.

Easter Sunday falls on April 1st this year which is also April Fools' day. While it sounds bad, I don't think it really is all that big a problem. I don't think people really observe April Fools' day so much. Perhaps we might incorporate the two emphases and say, "Don't be a fool! Easter is much more than bunnies and chocolate!" I know <u>you</u> know that, but you might be surprised at how many don't. We used to talk about "C & E" people who only attend church on Christmas and Easter. Sadly, I don't think there are too many "C & E" members anymore ... they have become "Nevers"! Like Ash Wednesday, I urge you to attend the Easter worship and join in the praise of our victorious and risen Lord."

This year Trinity is once again hosting one of the Mid-Week Lenten services of the West Seneca Community of Churches (WSCC). On March 21st at 7pm we have the opportunity to host and gather with fellow Christians from our West Seneca neighborhood. The theme for the WSCC Lenten series this year is "The Wideness of God's Mercy." Please join us on 3/21.

God bless you and your Lenten journey to the cross and the empty tomb!

MID WEEK LENTEN SERIES 2018: "Review and Renew"

As we continue our celebration of the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation, our Mid-Week Lenten Series will review the six chief parts of *Luther's Small Catechism*. This concept for a midweek Lenten series review of the Catechism is not a new idea at all. It was inspired by the Book of Concord: "Such matters also concern the laity and the salvation of their souls. Therefore we also confess Dr. *Luther's Small and Large Catechisms* as they are included in Luther's works. They are "the layman's Bible" because everything necessary for a Christian to know for salvation is included in them, which is handled more extensively in the Holy Scriptures." (FC Ep I 5)

Once again this year two services will offered each week, except for the last week, at 11:15am and 7:00pm. The morning service follows the mid-week Bible Class. The last mid-week service of Lent we will be hosting the West Seneca Community of Churches. The series will follow this schedule:

Recently one of our alum from last year's class was visiting and was telling me how much he missed it. I asked if he'd care to write his feelings for our church newsletter. I am grateful that Mr. Willert asked me to share a little bit of my experience at Trinity Christian School now as an alumni! Please let me start by thanking the Trinity Lutheran Church congregation and others that made it possible for me and other students to attend TCS through their prayers, financial commitment, and encouragement!

My years at Trinity are very close to my heart and some of the fondest of memories. For most of my life I had been in public schooling. From K-5 I attended an elementary school with no problems that I recall. I even had a couple teachers that were Christians that attended my church.

Although a lot changed when I went to the public middle school in sixth grade. I had a very hard time at this school, and wasn't able to share about my faith and Jesus freely, and therefore often dreaded stepping into the building. It was probably one of the most challenging school years of my life.

As a result of this I asked my parents to look at schools elsewhere or homeschool me, and thus I would eventually come to Trinity after a lot of conversations and prayer. I would say that the day that I shadowed Trinity Christian School was the highlight of my year. I wanted to transfer to Trinity immediately after shadowing in the Spring, but had to wait until the new school year started in the Fall. So, I attended Trinity, and my four younger siblings came with me. At first it was a little different adjusting from a class of about three hundred kids to a class of six, but I quickly grew to love the small class and close friendships that I made!

Our class forged friendships and relationships with the teachers and staff that will last far past eighth grade at TCS. During those two years, I grew as both a student and in my personal relationship with Jesus.

My prayer partners (within the church), the school musicals, and 8th grade class trip to Chicago are probably my favorite memories. The class trip was especially memorable since our class was so small with only six kids. I miss those days. I'm a little sad that 2017 is over, the year of both the class trip and my graduation from Trinity. Although I am so grateful for the time that I spent there as a student, and I will always be proud to be a TCS alumni!

The Power of Prayer

(Adapted from the Dr. Gerald Kieshnick blog)

In Pahrump (this is a real place), Nevada, the Diamond D brothel began construction on an expansion of their building to increase their ever-growing business. In response, the local Baptist Church started a campaign to block the business from expanding, with morning, afternoon, and evening prayer sessions at their church. Work on Diamond D's project progressed until the week before the grand re-opening when lightning struck the building and burned it to the ground! After the brothel burned to the ground by the lightning strike, the church folks were rather smug in their outlook, bragging about "the power of prayer." But shortly thereafter, Jill Diamond, the owner/madam of Diamond D, sued the church, the preacher and the entire congregation on the grounds that the church "was ultimately responsible for the demise of her building and her business, either through direct or indirect divine actions or means."

In its reply to the court, the church vehemently and vociferously denied any and all responsibility or any connection to the building's demise. The crusty old judge read through the plaintiff's complaint and the defendant's reply, and at the opening hearing he commented, "I don't know how I'm going to decide this case, but it appears from the paperwork that we now have a brothel owner who staunchly believes in the power of prayer and an entire church congregation that thinks otherwise."

The moral of this story is we'd better be careful about how and for what we pray. And if we really trust God to answer our prayer, when he answers the way we asked, we'd better be willing to say that that's exactly what happened and to give him the credit.

The Attitude of Stewardship Giving

Thanks be to our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ for all the Blessings he has bestowed on our Congregation this past year.

This is the time of year your Church Council begins to prepare for the upcoming Church Financial year. Your personal financial commitment is an important part of the process that help's shape the path of our ministry at Trinity Lutheran Church & School. Your General Fund Offerings make up 65% of the entire income of the Church Ministry.

Good money management is just good stewardship. In fact, another word for stewardship is "management." Unfortunately in managing that which God has given us, we tend to think of only money. But stewardship is much more than just money. Stewardship really involves our whole life and everything we do.

Psalm 24:1: "The earth is the Lord's and everything in it". So what can we own that doesn't belong to the Lord? I Timothy 6:7: "For we brought nothing into the world and we can take nothing out of it." Can you think of anything you have that didn't come from God? We need to realize that everything we HAVE and everything we ARE belongs to GOD- our money and possessions, but also our time, our skills, our talents, and our ATTITUDES. Our ATTITUDES determine the way we view ourselves and others and our circumstances. Our ATTITUDES affect every area of our lives and our relationships with others. And our ATTITUDES determine to a great extent the way we manage our money.

If we have determined that our money belongs to God, we need to think of money management as the relationship between God (the owner) and you and me (the managers). As managers, we are responsible for every dollar that passes through our hands. The first step in financial management is PLANNING. God has a plan for all of us and we are given specific instructions throughout the scriptures with promises given that we will reap whatever we sow. A good plan should be in writing, with goals and priority setting.

FIRST PRIORITY: GIVING/SAVING. These two things should go together.

- Before you pay any bills, take out at least 10% from your paycheck or pension check for the Lord's work.
- Next take out a portion for saving.

Why should you continue to save? Because, we have responsibilities as Gods Stewards:

- Romans 12:13: "Share with God's people who are in need; practice hospitality."
- I Timothy 5:8: "If anyone does not provide for his relatives, and especially for his immediate family, he has denied the faith and is worse than an unbeliever."
- I John 3:17: "If anyone has material possessions and sees his brother in need but has no pity on him, how can the love of God be in him?"

So the more we save, the more we are able to give and help others as the need arises. God blesses us, so we can bless others!

HOW SHOULD YOU GIVE:

- Matthew 6:1-4: "Be careful not to do your acts of righteousness before men, to be seen by them. If you do, you will have no reward from your Father in heaven... But when you give... do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, so that your giving may be in secret. Then your Father, who sees what is done in secret, will reward you." We shouldn't give to get praise and recognition from people if we want to receive God's blessings.
- I Corinthians 16:2: "On the first day of every week, each one of you should set aside a sum of money in keeping with his income..." (Need to give regularly)
- II Corinthians 9:7: "Each man should give what he has decided in his heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver."
- Malachi 3:8: "Will a man rob God? ... How? In tithes and offerings."
 (Tithe = 10% of gross income)

RESULTS OF GIVING: YOU WILL BE BLESSED. YOU HAVE GODS WORD ON IT!

- Luke 6:38: "Give and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down shaken together and running over, will be poured into your lap. For with measure you use, it will be measured to you."
- Proverbs 11:25: "A generous man will prosper; he who refreshes others will himself be refreshed."
- Matthew 6:33: "But seek first His kingdom and His righteousness, and all these things will be given to your as well." Priority: Put God First!
- Matthew 6:4: "So that your giving may be in secret. Then your Father, who sees in secret will reward you."

One of the main gauges I use when flying is called the "ATTITUDE INDICATOR". It tells me the aircraft position in relation to the Horizon. If the Attitude Indicator points up we're climbing; if it points down we're descending.

We all have an "Attitude Indicator" in our lives; we call it our FACE and our ACTIONS. Our FACE and ACTIONS shows how we are "flying" or living at that moment.

Our attitude is an inward feeling shown by an outward behavior. If we SMILE, people will know you are HAPPY. If you FROWN, people will know you are SAD or WORRIED. St. Paul tells us: "HAVE THIS ATTITUDE IN YOURSELVES WHICH WAS ALSO IN CHRIST JESUS." The HORIZON of our Christian Life is the example we see in Jesus. Monkeying With Tradition?

(Adapted from the Dr. Gerald Kieshnick blog)

Have you heard the story about the following psychology experiment? Here's how it goes:

You start with a cage containing four monkeys. Inside the cage you hang a banana on a string. Then you place a set of stairs under the banana. Before long a monkey will go to the stairs and climb toward the banana.

You then spray ALL the monkeys with cold water. After a while, another monkey makes an attempt. As soon as he touches the stairs, you spray ALL the monkeys with cold water. Pretty soon, when another monkey tries to climb the stairs, the other monkeys will try to prevent it.

Now, put away the cold water. Remove one monkey from the cage and replace it with a new monkey. The new monkey sees the banana and attempts to climb the stairs. To his shock, ALL of the other monkeys beat the dickens out of him. After another attempt and attack, he knows that if he tries to climb the stairs he will be assaulted.

Next, remove another of the original four monkeys, replacing it with a new monkey. The newcomer goes to the stairs and is attacked. The previous newcomer takes part in the punishment – with enthusiasm – because he is now part of the "team."

Then replace a third original monkey with a new monkey, followed by the fourth. Every time the newest monkey takes to the stairs, he is attacked.

In every case, the experienced monkeys that are beating up the new monkey have no idea why they were not permitted to climb the stairs. Neither do they know why they are participating in the beating of the newest monkey. Having replaced all the original monkeys, none of the remaining monkeys will have ever been sprayed with cold water.

Nevertheless, not one of the monkeys will try to climb the stairway for the banana. Why, you ask? Because in their minds, that is the way it has always been!

The original version of this story goes on to make application by suggesting that "monkeys" holding certain elected offices in governmental circles should all be replaced at the same time. It goes on to say that this suggestion is meant to show no disrespect to monkeys.

I'll suggest another application, albeit a fairly obvious one. In circles other than governmental ones, the same phenomenon sometimes occurs. In families, schools, churches, community organizations, neighborhoods, civic clubs, social groups, and almost any other collection of people one can imagine, traditions abound. We often don't know the source of traditions we follow. We simply follow them. Why? Because they are traditions. We've always done things that way.

Most us are pretty traditional, whether we admit it or not. Yet unless breaking a tradition requires violating biblical, moral, legal, or ethical principles, a tradition might well be replaced by a new practice that better accomplishes the organization's purposes or objectives. We might want to remember this story next time we come across a tradition that seems to have no intrinsic value or detracts from our mission and what we are trying to achieve.

During his earthly life, Jesus broke many traditions. And on a topic far more important than earthly traditions, he said: "Behold, I make all things new!" (Rev. 21:5)
