### "BRIDGE BUILDING STEWARDSHIP"

"Christian Stewardship is the free and joyous activity of the child of God and God's family, the church, in managing all of life and life's resources for God's purpose."

[Definition of Christian Stewardship from the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod.]

Last month I wrote to you about "Reformation Bridge-Building Vision." This month I want to preview our upcoming Stewardship Sermon Series in the month of November focusing on Bridge Building Christian Stewardship. Most Christians think of stewardship as sermons and campaigns on church budgets, pledging, giving and time/talent surveys. Without a doubt Christian Stewardship touches upon and interfaces with all of these, but it is much much more than fund raising and enlisting volunteers! This month I want to look at the basics of sound Biblical Christian Stewardship and bridge the gap that exists between a campaign and a lifestyle, a segment of life to our whole life.

C. S. Lewis, in his book, <u>Mere Christianity</u> wrote, "Every faculty you have, your power of thinking or of moving your limbs from moment to moment, is given you by God. If you devoted every moment of your whole life exclusively to His service, you could not give Him anything that was not in a sense His own already." As C. S. Lewis eloquently writes, everything is God's! Absolutely everything! All our time, our talents and abilities, even our power to think and move is from God! We really give Him nothing. He gives us everything! But He calls us to manage what He has given us. He desires that we joyfully, even cheerfully, manage all our life and resources in thanksgiving to Him and according to His will and purpose. This certainly goes far beyond a several week sermon series or Bible study on Christian stewardship, filling out a pledge-giving form and checking through a survey list of talents, abilities, skills and interests. God doesn't want just a tithe (10%) response. He desires and expects a whole 100% response! He calls us to faithfully and joyously manage all He has blessed us with from creation / nature to skills and abilities, material resources to His Holy Word and Sacraments!

Let me be very clear though. The more traditional foci of Christian Stewardship like time, talent and treasure are neither wrong nor bad. In fact they are very helpful as one examines his/her stewardship accountability. Pledging and encouraging tithing (giving 10%) are valid stewardship components when properly understood. Using the pledges and tithes of God's people in His church to formulate a resource budget for funding mission and ministry are sound and appropriate. But they are not <u>ALL</u> that Christian Stewardship is about. Properly understood, Christian Stewardship is a *whole life and 'all in'* joyous response of faith and thanksgiving to the creator and owner of everything. Our oldest calling from God is to "rule over" all His creation. That's our calling still today as His stewards and managers.

This month we want to look at some of the basic truths and myths, questions and answers concerning Biblical Stewardship and build a bridge from that to our every day lives. On November 17<sup>th</sup> I want to cover some/all of your questions about stewardship. Please submit your questions in writing and place them in my mail slot (in the coat room). # Congregational Voters' Meeting Report

This past Sunday, October 13<sup>th</sup>, Trinity Lutheran Church held a Voters' Meeting. Reports were heard and/or distributed in writing from the various Boards and Committees of the congregation. Especially noted were the many special projects that have been accomplished in the past five years or so from our mission activity in Haiti to the technology upgrades, property improvements and the creation of Stephen Ministry and our new Board of Elders. Mrs. Lynnae Kwilas was re-elected to the Executive Board and will also serve as the Vice President of the Board. The 2019-2020 Church and School Budget was presented, discussed and passed as presented. The adopted budget projects a deficit of \$17,452 and provides no salary increases for any of the church or school staff. It is hoped that perhaps mid-year some sort of increase or bonus might be given to the staff.

# Steward Builders

A newsletter to help you grow as a steward.

The purpose of this newsletter is to share God's Word so that our members will better understand who we are to be and what we are to do in the light of the Scriptures. It is our hope that this monthly publication will help you grow in your relationship with the Lord and as a Christian steward.

#### Stewards of Our Time

Are you a good steward of the time God has given you? God created time, and He still rules over that time. It is our responsibility not to waste it and to use it wisely as His faithful stewards. Of all the gifts that God gives us, time is one of the most precious, because we cannot save it, and we cannot have more. Keys to wise use of time include setting goals, deciding on priorities, and making plans based on God's will for our lives as it is revealed to us through study of His Word and prayers for His guidance. Without goals and priorities, we find that we are caught up in the "rat race" of the day and that our lives are out of balance.

Time, as well as other areas of life, is affected by God's principle of sowing and reaping. "The point is this: whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows bountifully will also reap bountifully" (2 Corinthians 9:6). If we spend our time unproductively, we will not reap the same rewards had we invested our time wisely. If we sow much, we will reap much. If we want to be proficient at tennis, golf, or playing the piano, we must commit the time and effort to practice in order to develop the necessary skills. The same principle holds in our lives as stewards.

Society pulls at us with all kinds of diversions that crowd our lives with things of no eternal value. What is important to us can be seen by where we spend our time. When we acknowledge God as the giver of time, how can we say we don't have time to do the things He would have us do? Our time is a gift from God, so it is proper and fitting that we use our time in ways that honor and glorify Him.



#### Stewards of Our Talents

In 1 Peter 4:10 we read, "As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another, as good stewards of God's varied grace." Here we learn again that God wants each of us to use our talents faithfully and responsibly. Paul said, "Whatever you do, work heartily as for the Lord and not for men" (Colossians 3:23). We should begin and live each day with the joy and vigor that come from hearts filled with thanksgiving to God for His love, His guidance, His presence, and His strength in whatever we do.

Scripture is full of instances where God has used ordinary people like us to accomplish extraordinary things. He chose a stammering Moses to lead His people out of bondage, self-serving fishermen, James and

John, to lead His Church and spread the Gospel, impulsive Peter's confession upon which to build His Church, and Paul, who spoke of a thorn in his flesh, to be the first great missionary of the Christian Church.

God uses imperfect people, those whom the world considers weak and flawed, to extend His kingdom. When we allow ourselves to be used by God in whatever way He chooses, He takes our meager talents and blesses them, making us examples for others around us. We are not perfect, nor do we know all there is to know about God's Word. Yet, we, like Moses, James, John, Peter, and Paul, are privileged by God's grace to participate in the work of His kingdom.

God has blessed us with gifts of time and talents, but the decision is ours whether or not we will use those gifts for the work of the Lord. Are we open to the possibilities before us? Are we willing to explore and grow? We should be, because, as redeemed children of God, we are enabled by the Holy Spirit to use faithfully our God-given talents for God's kingdom. God will always equip us for the tasks He gives us to do. It can be a bit risky or uncomfortable, but He is with us all the way.

## Stewards of Our Money

Of all the gifts that God gives us to manage as His stewards, money is probably the most difficult. Jesus knew the attraction money would hold for us and the effect it has on our lives. He said, "You cannot serve God and money" (Matthew 6:24). Having a proper view of money and possessions and managing them in God-pleasing ways are serious challenges that face all Christians.

Jesus also said, "Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" (Matthew 6:21). If money and the things money can buy become our treasure, God is pushed aside. We can't live our lives with a disclaimer that says, "Lord, I'll serve you spiritually but not with my money." Our relationship with Jesus should impact everything we do, including how we handle our money.



By God's providence, people have and make different amounts of money, but most people face the following tough questions: "How should I spend my money?" "Should I buy on credit?" "How much should I give?" "How much should I save and invest?" What you do with your money speaks volumes about you as a steward. Whether we have little or lots of money, it can be our treasure. Is your money being used as a tool to serve the Lord or a means to satisfy your own desires?

The giving of our money is an important part of being faithful stewards. Mature Christians who are under the control of the Holy Spirit understand the importance of giving and do so willingly and cheerfully. Jesus gave us the greatest and the most perfect gift by offering Himself on the Cross. With hearts filled with God's love for what He did for us, we become "givers" rather than "takers." Giving is an expression of our love for the Lord. In light of what God has done for us through His Son, how can we not give freely to Him?

Truly an undeserved heritage is given in God's yields! St. Peter wrote under inspiration, "Jesus Christ has caused us to be born again to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, to an inheritance that is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading, kept in heaven for you. 1Peter 1:3b-4

The gift of eternal life has been endowed on the Cross as an inheritance waiting for all who are called by the Holy Spirit. Consider reflecting such inheritance in your own plans.

    - ... after you find a pink slip with your final paycheck.
      - . . . after your family and friends have heard your story one too many times, but you still need to talk it out.
