"COVERED - 03" "After three days I will rise again" (Matthew 27:63)



Unprecedented! Life changing! Strange and surreal! Normalcy upended! These words are being used to describe the times and circumstances we are presently experiencing. People are seized in the grip of fear and hiding from the enemy, COVID-19, in their homes. All of a sudden death, or the threat of death, seems more real!


Death <u>is</u> real and has been since Adam and Eve disobeyed God in the garden of Eden. Now that was life changing! Jesus' mission of salvation took Him to the cross to die. The consequence of sin was and is death. But Jesus conquered sin and death when He suffered and died on the cross, was buried in the tomb, and arose three days later. Stephen Minister Chat?

A family-systems mentor once shared, "Depression stems from suffering from a loss, or anger turned inwards." In this virus time, loss and anger abound, with depression nipping at our collective heels.

When emotional pain is suppressed, it takes control of the emotional dashboard, steering the psyche into a dark hole that feeds on lack of interaction and movement. An inward-looking posture becomes self-fulfilling paralysis.

This is not saying mourning is wrong or unhealthy. Quite the opposite. Mourning will happen regardless of what we do. Jesus mourned repeatedly, both over the loss of his dear friend Lazarus and over the loss of his relationship with his Father.

But mourning should be relational. It is best experienced collectively, in the presence of those who love you and accept you in a spirit of grace, not judgment.

Mourning and moving belong together like complimentary lovers who bring strength to the other's weakness.

What have you lost that you need to mourn? What will the future look like once COVID-19 is a period of history we retell but no longer indwell?

COVID-19 AND FIVE GUIDE POINTS FOR THE EASTERN DISTRICT, LCMS By LCMS President Chris Wicher

"Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid." John 14:27

"Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God." *Philippians 4:6*

"Do not be afraid, little flock, for your Father has been pleased to give you the kingdom." Luke 12:32

"God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble. Therefore, we will not fear, though the earth give way and the mountains fall into the heart of the sea, though its waters roar and foam and the mountains quake with their surging." Psalm 46:1-3

Lately, we are living in what I would describe as surreal times. If your world has been like mine, your life has been turned around, your routine shuffled, and normalcy upended because of a tiny evil virus. It is normal to feel threatened, even though our faith calls for trust in God who truly is our constant and salvation in Christ Jesus.

Frankly, what we are experiencing is not new to the church. Through the ages, the church has survived through difficult times similar to what we are going through. So I have every confidence God's strength will again hold true for our present state of community health crisis. He who is for us is greater than the evil that is against us. It is just a matter of time before this crisis will pass. God in Christ has already won the victory for us which holds true for the body as well as for the soul.

While this present evil virus, named Covid-19, could easily infect anyone, and we rightly ought to take necessary and reasonable protective health precautions, yet our faith calls on us to trust God and utilize our God-given intellect. Faith and science, and add to that government and the medical community, are God-given. Our governing officials and health care providers are responding to this crisis as is their ordained duty. It is God's way of caring for our bodies. We are citizens of heaven and citizens of earth and God, in His wisdom and mercy, has ordained our community officials for our good health. It is well that we heed their direction and advise through this health crisis because, indeed, they are not out to destroy the church and our faith.

Covid-19 is real and it is evil. In its aggressive ways it does what it does to destroy life and inflict pain and misery. We know the virus is transmitted chiefly through human contact, and so the decisions our congregations and church workers make must respect this clear fact of physical life. I've said it before and I'll say it again, God speaks clearly through Word and Sacrament. God also speaks to us through government, science, and health officials. And so I would strongly advise everyone, during these extra-ordinary times, to avoid any unnecessary contact or worship or gatherings of more than ten individuals in the name of the church for a time, a decision that can be revisited periodically by each faith-community in the Eastern District.

Along these lines, I have had numerous questions come my way from church workers attempting to be of best service to their people, while not subjecting anyone to potential infection by Covid-19. Above anything else, this is the basis of everything I have said; the health of our workers and those they serve is to be protected. We cannot put ourselves or others in harm's way.

Consider the following five points as "guidance", even as my "directive", for this time of community health-crisis:

"Teach us to thank You, Lord, For love and grace. For life and vision For a purpose clear. For Christ Your Son, And for each human face That shows Your message Ever new and near." LSB 788 stanza 2

These are strange times we're living in. But, I'm pleased to see, our congregations and church workers are making appropriate adaptations. I've witnessed many creative changes to ordinary events and services. We have assembled a listing of worship services that can be viewed online and another listing of special ministry services that are being offered by our Eastern District congregations. 
