

AS WE GATHER

As we enter the midpoint of this Lenten season, today's Readings invite us to pause and assess our lives. Some of us are trying to make changes during this season—fasting, reinvigorating prayer, and doing extra acts of mercy. Whenever we try such things, we are reminded again of our own weakness. Try as we might, we cannot do it all perfectly. In today's Gospel, we hear that Jesus knows this too. That is why His entire life and ministry was given to cleansing our hearts and minds, forgiving our sins not seven times but seventy-seven times and more. As He cast the money-changing from the temple, so He again and again casts our sins away. We know our weakness and sin. Jesus knows too. He suffered and died for us, so that anyone who loves God is known by God. Through the cross of Jesus, we are known by God as His dear children.

People: the commandment of the LORD is pure, enlightening the eyes;

Pastor: the fear of the LORD is clean, enduring forever;

People: the just decrees of the LORD are true, and righteous altogether.

OLD TESTAMENT READING: Exodus 20:1-17

Reader: And God spoke all these words, saying,

"I am the LORD your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of

the house of slavery.

People: "You shall have no other gods before Me.

Reader: "You shall not make for yourself a carved image, or any likeness of

anything that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth. You shall not bow down to them or serve them,

for

People: I the LORD your God am a jealous God, visiting the iniquity of the

fathers on the children to the third and the fourth generation of those who hate Me, but showing steadfast love to thousands of those who

love Me and keep My commandments.

People: "You shall not take the name of the LORD your God in vain,

Reader: for the LORD will not hold him guiltless who takes His name in vain.

People: "Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy.

Reader: Six days you shall labor, and do all your work, but the seventh day is a

Sabbath to the LORD your God. On it you shall not do any work, you, or your son, or your daughter, your male servant, or your female servant, or your livestock, or the sojourner who is within your gates. For in six days the LORD made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, and rested the seventh day. Therefore the LORD blessed the Sabbath day and made it

holy.

People: "Honor your father and your mother,

Reader: that your days may be long in the land that the LORD your God is giving

you.

People: "You shall not murder.

You shall not commit adultery.

You shall not steal.

You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor.

You shall not covet your neighbor's house;

you shall not covet your neighbor's wife, or his male servant, or his female servant, or his ox, or his donkey, or anything that is your

neighbor's."

Reader: This is the Word of the Lord.

People: Thanks be to God.

EPISTLE: 1 Corinthians 1:18–31 (The foolish wisdom of God.)

For the message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written: "I will destroy the wisdom of the wise; the intelligence of the intelligent I will frustrate."

Where is the wise person? Where is the teacher of the law? Where is the philosopher of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since in the wisdom of God the world through its wisdom did not know him, God was pleased through the foolishness of what was preached to save those who believe. Jews demand signs and Greeks look for wisdom, but we preach Christ crucified: a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those whom God has called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For the foolishness of God is wiser than human wisdom, and the weakness of God is stronger than human strength.

Brothers and sisters, think of what you were when you were called. Not many of you were wise by human standards; not many were influential; not many were of noble birth. But God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise; God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong. God chose the lowly things of this world and the despised things—and the things that are not—to nullify the things that are, so that no one may boast before him. It is because of him that you are in Christ Jesus, who has become for us wisdom from God—that is, our righteousness, holiness and redemption. Therefore, as it is written: "Let the one who boasts boast in the Lord."

Reader: This is the Word of the Lord.

People: Thanks be to God.

HOLY GOSPEL: John 2:13-22 (23-25)

Pastor: The Holy Gospel according to St. John, the second chapter.

People: Glory to You, O Lord.

When it was almost time for the Jewish Passover, Jesus went up to Jerusalem. In the temple courts he found people selling cattle, sheep and doves, and others sitting at tables exchanging money. So he made a whip out of cords, and drove all from the temple courts, both sheep and cattle; he scattered the coins of the money changers and overturned their tables. To those who sold doves he said, "Get these out of here! Stop turning my Father's house into a market!" His disciples remembered that it is written: "Zeal for your house will consume me."

The Jews then responded to him, "What sign can you show us to prove your authority to do all this?"

Jesus answered them, "Destroy this temple, and I will raise it again in three days."

They replied, "It has taken forty-six years to build this temple, and you are going to raise it in three days?" But the temple he had spoken of was his body. After he was raised from the dead, his disciples recalled what he had said. Then they believed the scripture and the words that Jesus had spoken.

Now while he was in Jerusalem at the Passover Festival, many people saw the signs he was performing and believed in his name. But Jesus would not entrust himself to them, for he knew all people. He did not need any testimony about mankind, for he knew what was in each person.

Pastor: This is the Gospel of the Lord.

People: Praise to You, O Christ.
