FROM THE DESK OF PRESIDENT PINGEL PRESIDENT OF THE LCMS EASTERN DISTRICT

The subject of hospitality is an important one for our churches (and other businesses and organizations.) But the subject takes on heightened value for us given that it is a *scriptural* issue. Hospitality is mentioned in a number of places in the Bible. For instance:

"Extend hospitality to one another." (Romans 12:13)

"Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers." (Hebrews 13:2)

Hospitality is by definition "The friendly and generous reception of guests." Synonyms include such words as friendliness, welcome, and warmth.

Hospitality is grounded in the Gospel. The Scriptures tell us "*Welcome one another as Christ has welcomed you*." (Romans 15: 17) We who have been the recipients of mercy, grace, and all the blessings of life from the hands of our beneficent Heavenly Father now open our arms and hearts to others in the name of the Savior.

One of the best ways to think about hospitality is in terms of our own homes. When you are expecting guests at your house, what do you do to prepare? And when they actually arrive, what actions do you take? Do you offer them something to drink? Do you offer them a snack, cookie, or slice of pie? Do you provide them with a comfortable chair to sit on? Do you provide a comfortable environment for them during their stay? What "extras" do you include to make their time with you all the more enjoyable?

I like to think of hospitality in our churches in terms of a "front door" and a "back door."

"Front door" is a reference to the way we meet, greet, and treat visitors. Do we have a process in place? Have we thought things through in terms of EVERY Sunday, from the time the door in unlocked to the time the last person leaves? Often, when I bring up the subject of hospitality, the response is: "We have coffee hour once a month." What about visitors who show up the other three or four Sundays? "We have coffee and cake after first service." What about people who come to the second service the first time they visit? Is anything left for them?

Sometimes coffee and cake is offered in a room far away from the worship area. "Fellowship time is in the gym." Where is the gym? Where do I go? Will someone take me there—after all, I've never been here before. Why not locate the coffee and cake in proximity to the worship area? What about people who don't like coffee? Is there something for their children? Do we reserve a box of cookies in case we run out or do we just show the visitors crumbs and tell them to come back next week? Are the items displayed in such as way as communicates care was taken? Any thought to seasonal niceties on the coffee counter?

When people do stay, how do we ensure that at least someone will speak with them? All too often, church members are busy being friendly with each other but fail to see the new face in the crowd. Are visitors spotted and invited into circles of conversation? Is any of the conversation guest directed? "What brings you here? How did you hear about us? Do you live nearby? Gee, we're glad you came our way. We hope you will return!" What might be characterized as "small talk" is a lifeline to a newcomer, who often feels out of place and awkward.

Hospitality is also important at what I would consider the "Back Door." In other words, it is important that we "practice hospitality" with those already "in" the church. Our brothers and sisters in Christ need to be the objects of hospitality, too! A person can "join" our church but very easily fail to be "integrated" or fully "assimilated" into the community of faith. Think of your coffee hour as something of a safety net used to gather members of your church into closer fellowship with each other. There is a sense in which we are to "welcome one another" in the Name of Jesus every time we gather. The various aspects of hospitality, in my opinion, need to be intentional and continually cultivated, lest they "slip away," which can all too easily happen.

There is much more that could be said about hospitality. The first step is to observe. This Sunday, why not observe, and reflect. How well do we practice hospitality? What could we do better, so that Christ's welcoming love flow through us so as to touch the lives of others?

Release Date: September 1, 2021

History: Stephen Ministry began in 1975 when the Rev. Kenneth C. Haugk, Ph.D., a pastor and clinical psychologist, trained nine members of his congregation in St. Louis to be *Stephen Ministers*. They assisted him in providing Christian care and support to people in the congregation and community who were experiencing life difficulties. These trained caregivers were so enthused about their ministry, they encouraged Dr. Haugk to offer *Stephen Ministry* to more congregations.

Over the next few years, Dr. Haugk traveled to congregations and trained Stephen Ministers. This quickly proved to be inefficient, since he could visit only a limited number of congregations, and these congregations were then dependent on him to train additional caregivers. So in 1978 Stephen Ministries held the first Leader's Training Course and trained the first *Stephen Leaders*—representatives of various congregations who then returned home to train and supervise their own Stephen Ministers. Since then Stephen Ministries St. Louis has specialized in "training the trainers" through the Stephen Ministry system.

Definition of Stephen Ministry: Stephen Ministry is a complete system for training and organizing laypeople to provide one-to-one Christian care to hurting people in and around the congregation.

The Organization: Stephen Ministries St. Louis is a not-for-profit, transdenominational, religious and educational organization founded in 1975. The St. Louis-based staff of 40 provides support for ministry in more than 13,000 congregations worldwide. Dr. Haugk serves as Executive Director. **The Name:** The name *Stephen* comes from St. Stephen, who was the first layperson commissioned by the Apostles to provide caring ministry to those in need (Acts 6).

Stephen Ministry Statistics: These statistics are updated annually. Statistics can be obtained online at <u>stephenministries.org</u> or by calling Stephen Ministries at (314) 428-2600.

- **Congregations:** More than 13,000 congregations are enrolled in Stephen Ministry. They represent 185 different Christian denominations and come from all 50 states, 10 Canadian provinces, and 30 other countries.
- **People:** More than 75,000 pastors, church staff, and laypeople have been trained as Stephen Leaders at Leader's Training Courses. These Stephen Leaders have, in turn, trained more than 600,000 congregation members to be Stephen Ministers. Since 1975 Stephen Ministers have provided distinctively Christian care to more than one-and-a-half million people in one-to-one Stephen Ministry caring relationships and have also used their caregiving skills to touch the lives of millions more in other ways.

The Stephen Ministry Logo:

The logo Stephen Ministry congregations use consists of a cross and circle, together with a broken person and a whole person. The broken person stands behind the cross, symbolizing the bro-



kenness in our lives as a result of our sin. The whole person stands in front of the cross because it is through the cross of Jesus that we again are made whole. The circle symbolizes both the wholeness we receive through Christ and God's unending love for us.

Stephen Ministries: Media Fact Sheet

How the Stephen Ministry Works: Pastors, church staff, and lay leaders attend a Leader's Training Course, taught by the Stephen Ministries faculty, to learn how to implement Stephen Ministry in their congregation. These trained Stephen Leaders then begin and direct Stephen Ministry in their congregation. These trained *Stephen Leaders* then return home to begin and direct Stephen Ministry in their congregation.

Stephen Leaders recruit and select laypeople from the congregation to serve as Stephen Ministers and provide them with 50 hours of training in Christian caregiving. Topics include listening, feelings, assertiveness, confidentiality, and ministering to people in specific situations such as divorce, terminal illness, grief, and childbirth. Stephen Ministers also are trained to recognize when a care receiver's needs go beyond the care a Stephen Minister can provide and how to refer the care receiver for additional care.

At the end of training, *Stephen Ministers* are commissioned by the congregation. Stephen Leaders then link each Stephen Minister with a *care receiver*—a person in need of one-to-one Christian care. A Stephen Minister normally is assigned to only one care receiver at a time and meets with that person for about an hour each week.

Stephen Ministers also meet twice monthly for supervision and continuing education. Stephen Ministers initially commit to two years of service, but after those years many recommit to serve additional years.

Terminology: The organization, based in St. Louis, is *Stephen Ministries St. Louis*. The lay caregiving ministry system congregations implement is *Stephen Ministry*, once it has been implemented in a congregation. The pastors and laypeople trained by the Stephen Ministries faculty to direct their congregation's Stephen Ministry are called *Stephen Leaders*. The people trained to provide one-to-one care to those in need are called *Stephen Ministers*. Those who receive the care of Stephen Ministers are referred to as *care receivers*.

Important to Note

- Stephen Ministers are not counselors. They are trained Christian caregivers. Their role is to listen and care—not counsel or advise. Please do not refer to them as counselors.
- Stephen Ministry is a supervised ministry. Stephen Ministers engage in twice-monthly supervision to ensure that they are providing the best-quality Christian care.
- Stephen Ministry is a confidential ministry. What a care receiver tells a Stephen Minister remains confidential. Even in supervision, the names of care receivers and specific details are never discussed.
- Stephen Ministers do not make cold calls. They are assigned only to people who agree to receive the care of a Stephen Minister.
