"The Joyful Journey of Advent"

As we approach the end of the year, we find ourselves on the threshold of a special season in the Christian calendar—Advent. It is a time of reflection, anticipation, and preparation as we eagerly await the celebration of the birth of our Savior, Jesus Christ. The word "Advent" is derived from the Latin word "adventus," meaning "coming" or "arrival." During this season, we not only commemorate the historical event of Jesus' birth in Bethlehem over two thousand years ago but also prepare our hearts for His promised second coming. Advent spans four weeks, with each week focusing on a specific theme—Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love. Each theme corresponds to a candle on the Advent wreath, which we will light in succession throughout the season.

• Week 1: Hope (November 27 - December 3)

Hope is the foundation of Advent. As we light the first candle, we remember the hope that the prophets foretold—the coming of a Messiah who would bring salvation and restoration. It is a time to reflect on the promises of God and renew our trust in His faithfulness.

• Week 2: Peace (December 4 - December 10)

The second week of Advent directs our attention to peace. We reflect on the peace that Christ brings to our hearts and to the world. In a season often marked by busyness, Advent calls us to find moments of stillness and experience the peace that transcends understanding.

• Week 3: Joy (December 11 - December 17)

As we light the third candle, our focus shifts to joy. The joy of the shepherds, the angels, and the magi as they witnessed the fulfillment of God's promises in the birth of Jesus. This week encourages us to embrace the joy that comes from knowing our Savior and sharing His love with others.

• Week 4: Love (December 18 - December 24)

The final week of Advent centers on love. God's love for us was demonstrated in the gift of His Son. As we light the fourth candle, let us reflect on the profound love that compelled God to enter our world and the love we are called to share with one another.

This Advent season, let us embark on a joyful journey of faith and anticipation. May our hearts be filled with hope, peace, joy, and love as we prepare to celebrate the birth of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Trinity Lutheran Church's History - Part 2

1850-1853: Taking Further Steps

After the signing of the constitution, further steps were taken to assure the continuation of the young congregation. Two deacons, Michael Lebert and Carl Kromphardt, were elected to serve until a pastor could be called. In January of 1850, a second meeting was held to elected three trustees whose duty it was to file papers of incorporation with the town clerk's office, which was accomplished on February 12, 1850. Those men were Godfried Grotke, Adam Koch, and Michael Escherich. In November of 1851, Trinity's congregation extended a call to Ernest Buerger, as its first pastor. At the time, he was pastor of First Trinity in Buffalo. Accepting the call, he moved out to the country and purchase a small plot of land on the east side of Orchard Park Road about a quarter mile south of what is now the five corners. He erected a log building which served as a home, schoolhouse and place of worship. In 1853, Pastor Buerger was instrumental in Trinity's joining the Synod of Missouri, Ohio and other States, now known as the Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod.

1849-1859: Came Through Early Struggles

During the first decade of their existence, Trinity's Congregation grew from 12 to approximately 35 families. The pastor performed 223 baptisms, confirmed 75 children and married 47 couples. There were 49 burials, 35 of which were children below the age of 13, giving a hint of the high mortality rate at that time. In 1851 a two-acre lot was purchased for \$75. The building, which was completed in less than four months, cost \$232.85. Most of the labor and materials were donated by the members. Only one carpenter was hired to supervise the actual construction. The founding pastor, Ernest Buerger, who also had served as school principal and teacher, accepted a call in October 1858 to serve in Washington, D.C. His son Paul Theodore Buerger then became the principal and served until 1861. Pastor L. Dulutz from First Trinity cared for the congregation until a new pastor was installed in May 1860.

Stephen Ministers Offer Emotional and Spiritual Support in Times of Trouble

Mary Larrabee's life was a mess. Her marriage had just ended in divorce, she underwent two major surgeries, and then her grown son was murdered.

"As a friend of mine put it, the manure truck just kept backing up and dumping on me," Larrabee said.

Then she heard about Stephen Ministry at her church.

The ministry matches specially trained members of a congregation with people going through a tough time. Nationwide, more than 10,000 churches representing more than 150 different Christian denominations offer Stephen Ministry.

Larrabee was matched with Stephen Minister Kathy Ames, a fellow member of North Naples United Methodist Church, and the two met once a week for more than a year.



"I'm stronger and I know how precious every day is," says Mary Larrabee, right, who was helped with a life crisis by her Stephen Minister Kathy Ames. "She would hold my hand and let me spill out my heart. I call her my earth angel."

"She would hold my hand and let me spill out my heart," Larrabee said of Ames. "I call her my earth angel. She really helped me through a hard time in my life. She didn't give me specific advice as much as she just listened to me and validated my pain."

Now that the formal Stephen Ministry relationship has ended, the two remain friends.

"I will always be grateful to her for all of her prayers and all that she did to help me," Larrabee said.

Stephen Ministry began in St. Louis in 1975 when the Rev. Kenneth Haugk, a pastor and clinical psychologist, found he was unable to meet the needs of all the people in his congregation. He trained nine laypeople in his church to assist him in providing Christian care to people who needed encouragement.

It went so well that Haugk began training Stephen Ministers in other congregations. That, in turn, led to the establishment of the Stephen Series Leader's Training Course, which trains pastors and lay leaders to go back to their congregations and train others to become Stephen Ministers.

"We train the trainers," said Joel Bretscher, Director of Communications at the Stephen Ministries headquarters in St. Louis. "We train the Stephen Leaders who then go home to train the Stephen Ministers in the congregation." Stephen Ministers then provide one-to-one emotional and spiritual care to people in need.

The name Stephen comes from St. Stephen, who was the first layperson commissioned by the Apostles to provide caring ministry to those in need, Bretscher said.

"Ordained pastors often find there are more needs for care than they can provide, so Stephen Ministers are there to supplement, but not replace, pastoral care," Bretscher said.

In Stephen Ministry, women are matched with women and men are

matched with men. It is also important to note that Stephen Ministers are available to care for anyone in the community who is hurting, not just church members, said Becky Jarrell, Director of Congregational Care at North Naples United Methodist Church.

"We are here for anyone experiencing a life crisis, whether it's death, divorce, illness, relocation, financial difficulty or whatever the need," Jarrell said. "It enriches the church to have this consistent outreach available to anyone in the community who needs help."

"It's a wonderful thing to see God working in people's lives."

Over the past eight years, North Naples United Methodist Church has trained more than 60 people to become Stephen Ministers, she said. At Community Congregational Church in Naples, there are more than 20 active Stephen Ministers, said Gini Reinhold, Director of Congregational Care.

"The Stephen Minister is there to walk with you throughout your crisis and to help you see that, with God's love, you will be okay," Reinhold said.

Stephen Ministers go through 50 hours of training and commit to serving for two years. Most choose to serve much longer after they find they get as much out of the ministry as they give, Reinhold said.

"It's a wonderful thing to see God working in people's lives," she said. "There's something special about knowing that God has put you in a certain place at a certain time to help a certain person. Stephen Ministers grow a lot as a result."

Patty Lengemann knows what it's like to be on both sides of the fence. She had her own Stephen Minister about five years ago when she went through a divorce. "I know how wonderful it is to give and receive," Lengemann said.

"My Stephen Minister gave me the courage to start over again. Now I want to give something back."

"The Stephen Minister is there to walk with you through your crisis and to help you see that, with God's love, you will be okay."

Lengemann, a member at Community Congregational, has had two care receivers since she became a Stephen Minister.

"So far, I've been matched with people going through the same kind of pain I experienced, so I'm able to identify with what they're going through," she said. "I'm able to share my experience with them and help them to see that, when God closes one door, he opens another."


To My Trinity Family,
